Ecological Imperialism - written by Alfred Crosby.

He explained how the crops played a role in colonization and emergence of imperialism; crops like sugar, tea was introduced in the new world and this lead to a new phase in colonization or dominance. The definition was introduced as the plant species consciously cultivated for an assured hope of return, either for substance or profit. The idea which evolved during this phase was how the 'cropness' of the crop changes as time passes. He also took the example of Marigold which was flower with mystical features among the Aztecs and how it turned to be a part and parcel of the modern Christian worship.
