In her hour-long lecture, Dr. Prasad explained how the introduction of the Railways in India had an impact on the lives of the common people with narratives of anecdotes and records from the colonial era. She emphasized on how the railways which was initially started as a commercial venture gained popularity among the Indians and grew exponentially. Her own work "Tracks of change" was also

quoted. The lecturer gave accounts on the commercial view of the colonizers and also presented the methods adopted by the colonizers to introduce a single standard time in different regions. So it contributed to the unification of India both in case of time and economy. It also removed the barriers among the divided India and presented a clear platform for their interactions. The lecture began with 3 narratives which
