It fosters an atmosphere of intellectual vigor and moral rectitude in which the youth of our country may find their fulfilment and achieve greatness as eminent men and women of service.

OVERVIEW

Department of Service Learning (Outreach) was established in the year 2001-2002 with the Ignatian pedagogy of neighbourhood development by Rev. Dr. V. Joseph Xavier S.J. This programme aims at forming men and women for others for a better society. Outreach is the third dimension of higher education in Loyola College and endeavours training the college students for their attitudinal change. It is a novel step in the Jesuit higher education for promoting a value-based, fraternity, equality, justice and a violence free society. Every student is made to critically understand the society and develop critical consciousness which motivates them to serve mankind. Seasoning of the heart, spiritual blending of the mind, pro-poor are the key areas of invisible change to be created among the student community.

VISION:

To facilitate the student community to become socially responsible citizens and to be sensitive to the needs of the disadvantaged sections.

VALUES:

To imbibe the love and concern for others, students should dedicate themselves to community service, thereby shaping themselves as men and women for others.

MISSION:

To create a society with committed youth to promote equality, Justice, education, health and environment for the underprivileged.

AIM:

To help the neighbouring communities to transform themselves through programmes on literacy, health promotion, women empowerment, youth clubs and reduction of dropouts in schools.

OBJECTIVES:

- To enable the students to learn social responsibility.
- To provide an exposure about slums and create an ambience to reflect on the possible ways of intervention in their development.
- To learn from the people's experience and try to create facilities that would empower them.
 - To make our institution and individuals to realize our duty towards serving the neighborhood communities.

INTERVENTION AREAS:

Right from the inception of Outreach, we have been working in slums in the city of Chennai in the zones of 5, 8, 9, 10 and 13. We have intervened 43 slums where the second year undergraduates and the first year post graduates do their interventions.

FLOOD RELIEF PROGRAMME (AUGUST - SEPTEMBER 2019)



The Department of Service Learning conducted a Flood Relief programme for the flood affected victims of Kerala and Tamil program Nadu. The floods had occurred due to the Southwest Monsoon rains. Prior to the camp, there was cashbox collection in the campus and students were encouraged to donate according to their capabilities. More than Rs. 11.7 lakh worth of materials and money was obtained from Loyola College and various other organizations. That money was used to buy relief materials such as bed sheets, blankets, utensils and buckets. As a follow-up, on september 23, 2019 two student teams reached Wayanad, Kerala and Nilgiris, Tamilnadu. The students were taught about the lifestyle of the tribal community. The students were split into groups and delivered the supplies to the identified remote villages, particularly for the tribal community. The last event of this program was the valedictory session and every single student shared their experiences. Almost all the students had a new experience and they appreciated the simple life of the tribalcommunity. The

PSYCHO SOCIAL SUPPORT SERVICES TO THE AFFECTED PEOPLE

Six Collection boxes were kept in 6 different spots to collect cash from the staff and students in the College Campus, from 22nd to 27th August, 2019.

OBJECTIVES OF THE RELIEF WORK:

To be with the suffering ones, listen to the people who are in need, empathize with the people who lost everything, observe the loss of the people's resources, distribute the collected relief materials like blankets, bed sheets and household articles.

SPORTS DAY FOR THE DISABLED

The department of service learning in Loyola College, Chennai conducted a sports day for the differently abled. The programme was held on 12/02/2019 from at the Football Ground. The inauguration began at 2:00 pm.

The sports day was inaugurated by Rev. Dr. Selvanayakam, SJ and the welcome speech was delivered by Rev. Dr A. Louis Arockiaraj, SJ, Director, Department of Service Learning. The chief guest for the function was Mr. Joseph D Ravi, Retd. District Differently-Abled Welfare Officer in Chennai. Four events were conducted by the students and 28 members enthusiastically participated in it. The events wheel chair race, running race, shot put and passing ball were





conducted. At 4:00 pm, the valedictory function was held and Br. John Xavier addressed all the participants.

Prizes were distributed by the Chief Guest and staff. All the participants received prize kits from the staff. The Vote of Thanks was delivered by Prof. Ratna. The purpose of the program was to give differently abled people an opportunity to show their talents in front of public and it did so, successfully.

He asked the students to observe the slums in Chennai from a common man's perspective.



UG ORIENTATION PROGRAMME



The Department of Service Learning (Outreach) organized orientation programmes for the Under-Graduate Students from 26th June, 2019 to 1st July, 2019. The Shift-I and Shift-II students attended their sessions in their respective schedules. Rev. Dr. Louis Arockiaraj, The Director, the Outreach professors and the college officials explained to the students the needs of community service, knowing the needs of people in substandard settlements, and various societal problems. The programme began with a prayer led by the students, after which, the outreach professors began the session. Some of them shared their experiences about playing their role as a faculty from their department, and how they felt during their visit to the outreach destinations. The third-year undergraduate students shared their experiences about Outreach. During the orientation program, the water scarcity problems among the community were discussed. They were informed about the depleting water supply in the city of Chennai, the daily amount of water for the average person, and measures to save water at an individual level. The session ended with a Vote of Thanks given by a second year student.



REVOLVING FUND



The Department of Service Learning had initiated an event to distribute a small sum of Rs. 5000 for the deserving women from slums as part of empowering entrepreneurial pursuits. The amount was credited directly to their bank accounts. They are required to repay the amount in ten instalments of Rs.500. The event was organized at Fr. Principal's office, in which the 14 beneficiaries received the loan amount on 11th February, 2020. Rev. Fr. Principal in his message encouraged the women to repay their instalments without fail so that many more such deserving women could be benefitted.



LEADERSHIP TRAINING PROGRAMME

Department of Service Learning along with Department of Social Work organized a Leadership Traning programme in a joint venture as a new initiative. This was conducted in view of motivating the best volunteers in their service learning activity during the previous academic year

(2018-2019). Rev.Dr.Jerry was the resource person for the training which was held on 4th February 2020. There were 35 participants for the training. A brief description of Citizen Amendment Act 2019 was explained to the students.

The impact of introducing the act was discussed and the responses were analysed. All the participants who attended the training responded that the briefing gave them a great deal of knowledge about the details of the act and they expressed that the public should be made aware of its intricacies.

AWARENESS ON MEDICINAL PLANTS

The Youth development team and Palvadi team of Loyola College have conducted a camp on 13 September 2019, were awareness about common medicinal plants were given. On the particular day, we made everyone gather near the temple in South Boag road, Prem Nagar colony opposite to Krishnaswamy Kalyanamandabam. We bought different kinds of medicinal plants such as Tulsi, Thoothuvalai, Pirandai, Poonaimeesai, Palvalipoondu, Vidaamoongin, Thippili, Insulin etc. The students explained them about the medicinal values of each plant and its purposes. The students also explained how to use the plants as medicine and also how to maintain the growth of the plant as well. The programs highlight was the sapling distribution to the people of the community.

CANCER AWARENESS PROGRAMME

The students of Commerce 2nd year 'B' section conducted a special event on a cancer awareness programme for the people of Dr. Thomas Road on 13th February. The event was conducted under the guidance of Prof.Antonysamy. We approached the Apollo Cancer specialty hospital for the awareness camp. The guest speaker had come from Apollo hospital to deliver a speech and create awareness among the people. She made them understand the need for a balance between a healthy diet and lifestyle. After the end of the programme, the students provided refreshments for the all the people. The event was a great success as the participants expressed gratitude to the students for conducting the awareness programme.

TRAINING PROGRAMME ON ENTREPRENEURSHIP

Ms. Shubha Lakshmi, a resident of the Egmore slum area learnt embroidery on her own. Soon she taught her magnificent embroidery skills to other ladies in the neighborhood as well. During the outreach visit, the students of B.com general of section A found out about these talented women and helped them flourish their talent by contributing various fabrics to them for them to practice on it. The students organized a five day long entrepreneurship training program to skill the women efficiently. At the inauguration ceremony of the entrepreneurship training program. The Chief Guest for the function, Dr. Siva Kumar, the President of Commerce Forum, motivated the women to achieve their desired goals and start their own business. At the valedictory ceremony students distributed sarees to all the women to celebrate their growth and commitment towards their skill.

IMPORTANCE OF KAAVALAN APP

The students of Commerce E section visited the G3 women police station in Kilpauk and invited the Police inspector Sudha and three women constables to address ia programme at the college intended to spread awareness about the Kaavalan App. She humbly accepted our request. The students also invited Miss. Ulagammal, an expert on women's counselling, to give counselling for the community women. The inspector demonstrated how to use the app, its purpose being that if a women feels uncomfortable at her travel at night, she could use the app to request a pink police patrol to drop the concerned women, the inspector concluded her speech by requesting the students to spread the word about the resourcefulness of the app.

QUIZ COMPETITION FOR CHILDREN

The students of Department of History conducted a quiz competition for the children in the Pudupet slums in Chennai. The school teaching group took the initiative for this program and they decided to give prizes to the winners. The students select questions only from the general topic. The program was conducted on 2/02/2020. There were twenty to twenty five students actively participated in the program and it became a better experience for the students for acquiring the knowledge. The school teaching team coordinates all the activities and makes program a grand success. The program became a benefit to the children to achieve the knowledge and it approximately helps more than 30 students in the Pudupet slum.

SIDDHA AWARENESS PROGRAM

In association with the Department of Service Searning the Elders group of Mathematics Shift 2 conducted a programme for the elderly people residing in the slum area of Indira Gandhi Nagar with the experienced Siddha doctor Dr Juliet. L (Siddha Central research Institute). The program took place on 21st February 2020. The students invited all the elderly people to the hall . The programme began with Dr. Juliet's address as she gave a lot of ideas about Siddha and home medicine, which was followed by Prof. Milson's sensational speech concerning the hardships of living and about the importanceof Siddha and homemedicine.

PHYSIOTHERAPY FOR ELDERS

The Department of Viscom conducted Physiotherapy session for the elders of Kaalvankarai. Amidst her hectic schedule, Dr. Anita's (From Help Age India) sheer support and guidance aided the Elderly Team students of 18 UVC were able to successfully conduct the Physiotherapy camp which benefited the senior citizens from the Saidapet slum.

The programme was made a huge success with the help of Dr. Anita from Help Age India with the help of two interns from American College, the department of SOCIAL Work and 2 social workers from Social work Department, Loyola College supported a lot throughout the programme.

The programmw was conducted for 2 days 18th Feb,2020 and 19th Feb,2020. Around 20 elders and physically challenged people had attended the program.

We are thankful to be a part of this event, thanks to the social work department and mainly our hero, Anand Sir who was so passionate day in and day out through every outreach classes which is what lit the spirit in the room and made us all push through.

UNNAT BHARATH ABHIYAN-PROJECT

The Central Government initiated the Unnath Bharath Project which Loyola Outreach has adopted in 5 villages, namely Vembedu, Manabatthi, Sirdavoor, Melayur and Aalathur. Grama Sabha Meetings are an integral part of grassroot level administration and the Outreach Department Professors attended the same, playing their part in them.

In Loyola, the PG students are given exposure to both rural and urban, in their first and second years respectively. There is a balance between both rural and urban exposure. The students of Loyola feel that the outreach program is about giving, contributing and helping those who cannot help themselves. The students go to the rural camps where others don't, and reach out to those who aren't reached out by others. It's also a great opportunity for the younger generation as it influences them to give back to the community. It helps the community grow in a substantial way. The house visits not only helps the students to interact with the villagers but also makes them realize the struggles faced by the people for making a their livelihood. At the end of the rural camp schedule, a community programme is conducted by the students for the villagers, in a selected village, where the students get an opportunity to exhibit and reflect on their talents.



SALIENT FEATURES OF THE CAMP

The students in each of the camps would usually begin the day with meditation and prayer along with meditation/yoga and a few physical and stretching exercises. A good start to any event is through prayer. The prayers were conducted in each of the different faiths to invoke the blessings of God.

The tasks that were allotted to the students were based on the needs of a particular village and it was intended to be beneficial to the villagers and also help the students understand and appreciate the value of physical labour while being engaged in it.

Scarcity of water, shifting from agriculture to other professions like brick making, daily wage jobsorthe 100 days government scheme. Since crops like rice require high amount of water, it isn't very prominent in these areas. Crops like groundnut are rather more common due to the lower water requirement.

Students in each of the camps would conduct cultural programmes which were based on their observations, learnings, social issues and problems faced by the villagers and also what they dreamed about the village.





Low wages, debts, lack of transport facilities, unstable homes, poor market in the villages for their goods and the involvement of middlemen were the major problems the villagers faced.

Health care access is minimal due to the lack of transportation. Students could observe that the dominant caste tenements were away from the fields and were spaciously divided, unlike the oppressed areas where the fields were lined too closely.


