



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RAIN THAT SHOOK CHENNAI





The Annual North East Monsoon, in November 2015 ravished the coramandel coast of South Indian Regions: Tamil Nadu, Puducherry, and Andhra Pradesh. Tamil Nadu received a persistent rainfall which caused massive damage to Chennai and some of its north interior districts: Kancheepuram, Tiruvallur, and Cuddalore. The deluge fed the low-lying territories of the capital city (Chennai) in flood water which forced its residents to evacuate on their own to seek refuge in safe areas.

The Initiation:

On December 2, 2015, Rev. Dr. G. Joseph Antony Samy, S.J., Principal, Loyola College along with a few staff volunteers visited the rain affected areas located around Loyola College. The floods had gushed into the streets of Namachivayapuram engulfing the residents and their living settlements, the devastation of the neighborhood was evident

The Plan of Action:

As a small beginning, the management initiated a core committee to discuss on handling the situation with remedial measures. The college management planned proactive measures to promptly address the pressing needs of the flood victims by organizing a relief camp: Loyola Rain Relief Service (LRRS)

The Valiant Volunteers and the Accommodation:

Loyola College, as a Jesuit Institution, has extended its support to 2500 plus people who were rendered homeless by the flood and played a vital role to ensure the safety of displaced families before the emergency responses from the government and other quarters.

Initially, the student volunteers visited the drowned areas and distributed food to the people. On observing the condition of the homeless victims, the college opened up its gates to the affected people. LRRS had 30 staff, and 250 energetic students, who served towards the relief measures. The volunteers of Loyola worked tirelessly to maximise the vistas of the relief measures.

Food And Amenities

Food and basic amenities were distributed to the inmates. The inmates were provided with bedsheets, mats and dresses. LRRS recognized that the affected people were in need of certain essentials to perform their routine. These much needed provisions were collected from the sponsors and were distributed to the people. The provisions kit included clothes, paste, brush, towels, mosquito coil and sanitary napkins.

Medical:

Along with food supplies, the medical needs were also taken care at a higher extent. The college provided various medical facilities for the affected people to prevent them from the epidemics of water-borne diseases. The volunteers distributed medicines and basic sanitation materials to women and children. A medical team consisting of 8 doctors offered medical treatment for nearly 1750 flood victims boarding in the Loyola premises.

SOME SALIENT FEATURES...

Recreation:

To keep the children entertained and to make them forget their worries, the volunteers conducted many fun games.

NCC team:

The NCC team of Loyola provided security for people who spent their days and nights and assisted the people who stayed in the camp.

Everyday Evaluation:

Rev. Dr. S. Lazar, SJ, Secretary & Correspondent, Loyola College conducted committee meetings regularly and initiated discussions for betterment of the camp. Every evening, the officials and the committee coordinators met to evaluate the strategies employed in procuring the materials and distributing it to the affected people.

Outreach distribution:

The department of Outreach having identified the needs of the flood affected people of 34 slum areas like Choolaimedu, Chinthathripet, Tenampet, Pudupet, Saidapet, distributed relief kits. Totally 5700 families benefitted from this measure.

LSSS distribution:

About 325 affected families of Loyola College students in and around Chennai were distributed rain relief kits. A counseling session was organized by AURA club to motivate the students of these families.

Other affected areas covered:

The Volunteers took the challenging task of distributing basic amenities to flood victims in other affected areas of Chennai, Cuddalore, Thiruvallur, and Kancheepuram districts. They rescued the flood victims and distributed food, water, clothes and medicines to the HIV patients. It's our pride to mention that our rescue team won the appreciation of becoming the first team to visit most of the areas affected by the flood.

The Concluding function:

The people who found a safe haven at Loyola college had to start their life from the scratch. Having focused on this, Loyola took its next step on rehabilitation and reconstruction.

After a long night, a rehabilitation kit was prepared and the inmates were given a token per family. Every kit consisted of all the essential goods for a complete new start up of life for the refugees. All donors and sponsors were also invited for the meeting. Around 530 kits were distributed on that day. People were all satisfied and thanked the LRRS team for their hospitality and timely aid.

LRRS Thanks giving Ceremony:

On 26th of January, a thanks giving programme to LRRS donors and volunteers was organized by Loyola Rain Relief Service. Hundreds of volunteers and donors were present during the occasion. The services rendered to the flood affected victims during recent Chennai rain and deluge were appreciated by a great many.

"Shillong is my hometown, it's in the northeastern part of India, in the state of Meghalaya. I belong to the Khasi tribe"

Meghalaya means 'abode of clouds' in Sanskrit. It is a small state but it is so enchanting and eye catching that it is also known as the Scotland of the east. Meghalaya is known for its music which is loved and adored by its inhabitants and those who discover it.

TO WHICH DO I LET DOWN? SCIENCE OR SUPERSTITION

All my life I have conscientiously followed the traditional values taught to me by my parents. As an amateur in my childhood, I was a puritanical boy, never forgetting the practice of going to temple and wearing sacred ash all over my body. I remember asking myself a question, "from where and from who did the life of god commence?", but I don't remember getting an answer to my question (even from the priests).

Later on, as more questions arose, I slowly began to change my path from devotional practices. To say frankly, for some period, I played an antagonist role against religion. Once I had a mindset that, physics is just a subject which deals with academics, till I understood the essence of science. I have tried reading both scientific and religious books to get answers about God and the origin of the universe. It was only later that I realized that this was a wrong thing to do. I should have confined to a single idea either in religion or science. My lack of expertise in either of these troubled me as I did not completely understand any one of them. This led me to an agitated state of mind in which I am still oscillating.

When we talk of science and superstition, it appears as though we are trying to put two opposite entities together and by doing so put forth an awkward act. As science advances, it shatters the illusionary and self-created fantasy worlds of the people. On one hand science appeals to reason, logic and is explainable. But superstition failed to show these three qualities. Sometimes I used to wonder the act of gurukkal in the temple, the way they act and dance. It seems that they are possessed by God. It appears to me as a trick to collect some money or to get the attention of devotional visitors. But there is one thing which nags me constantly. Why the visitors do the same act like the gurukkal? This question stops me from jumping into a conclusion. The reason behind the higher hierarchy level of science than superstition is that science explains things with proof, whereas in superstition, information is available only in books and sayings, which fails to prove its status. Many educated people in India never accept the practice of serving curd to their children before exams. To them, it is a kind of superstition activity, but none of them know that, an acid name "oleic acid" contained in the curd naturally calms and relaxes, which is scientifically proven.

This is where the program actually starts. We argue without knowing the difference between science and God. Leaving the warmth of their dreams is one of the most difficult things for people to do and so, of course, most of them don't do it. As Francis Bacon said "we prefer to believe what we prefer to be true". Our world is one where there is no single answer to any question and is not built with clear ideas.

So, as an indecisive teenager and as a puritanical teenager and as a physics student, I find no other way, than following a system of AGNOSTICISM.
